

Summary

The present report summarises the results obtained in the context of the virological surveillance activities in Italy, coordinated by the National Influenza Centre (NIC) laboratory at ISS, in collaboration with a network of 23 regional influenza laboratories (InfluNet).

During the sixteenth week of virological surveillance (week 10/2023) for the 2022/2023 season, influenza virus circulation is quite stable in Italy, after the peak registered at the end of 2022. The proportion of influenza positive specimens observed this week slightly decreased (14.8%), in comparison to the previous one (17.2%). In particular, this week, 929 clinical specimens were received by the InfluNet network laboratories and, among the 855 analyzed samples, 127 (14.8%) resulted positive for influenza. Among these samples, 38 belonged to influenza type A (4 were H3N2, 27 were H1N1pdm09 and 7 have not been subtyped yet) and 89 to influenza type B.

Among the above analyzed samples, 27 (3%) resulted **SARS-CoV-2** and 171 were attributed to other respiratory viruses, in particular 44 (5.1%) Rhinoviruses, 38 (4.4%) Metapneumoviruses, 31 (3.6%) RSV, 29 Adenoviruses, 16 Parainfluenza viruses and 13 human Coronaviruses (not SARS-CoV-2).

So far, in the 2022/2023 influenza season (week 46/2022-10/2023), a large prevalence of influenza type A viruses (86.8%) has been observed, mostly belonging to the H3N2 subtype. In particular, among a total of 22,990 collected samples, 5,588 (24.3%) resulted positive for influenza, of which 4,850 (86.8%) were positive for influenza A and 738 (13.2%) for influenza B.

Among the influenza A viruses, 81% (N=3,933) were A(H3N2) and 12% (N=593) were A(H1N1)pdm09; the remaining 324 A strains have not been subtyped yet.
